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## Committee Formed To Schedule Food Trucks

At the January Huber Ridge Area Association meeting, an idea was suggested and accepted to form a committee to arrange for food trucks to come to our neighborhood on a regular basis. With the ongoing pandemic keeping more people at home, bringing a variety of food trucks to the residents offers a little change to the normal mealtimes.

A post was put up on the Huber Ridge Area Association Facebook group by HRAA President Jeannie Black calling for volunteers for the committee. Four neighbors stepped forward to give their efforts to this committee: Carolyn Cordray, Catherine Ho, Trisha Bell-Miller and Kelly Schroeder. The committee met quickly and put together some basic framework of how they would work to start scheduling trucks.

# Dangers of Carbon Monoxide

It's been called the silent killer. Carbon monoxide, an odorless, colorless gas toxic to humans and animals, was the cause of 20 emergency calls in Westerville and Blendon Township in 2019.

Carbon monoxide, known by the chemical symbol CO, acts as poison once inhaled. It attaches to the hemoglobin in the red blood cells, which carries oxygen throughout the body. When CO attaches, it blocks the oxygen the body must have, leading to hypoxia. CO is a byproduct of incomplete combustion. Any fuel burning device may produce dangerous levels of CO gas. In the home, heating and cooking equipment are potential sources of CO. Vehicles, generators and lawn equipment can also produce dangerous levels of CO.

The most common symptoms of CO poisoning are headache, dizziness, fatigue, nausea, vomiting and confusion. High levels of CO ingestion can cause

loss of consciousness and death. The health effects of CO exposure can vary from person to person depending upon the level and length of exposure, as well as each individual's health condition.

Carbon monoxide can only be detected with a CO detector/alarm. These detectors are available in plug-in, battery-powered or hardwired models. Before buying a CO detector, check to make sure it is listed with Underwriter's Laboratories (UL), standard 2034, or there is information on the package that states it is UL approved. Install a CO detector in the hallway near every sleeping area of the home. CO detectors should be replaced every five years. If the CO detector

alarms, call 9-1-1. If you have any symptoms or feel ill, leave the home or building and await the Fire Division's arrival.

The Fire Division recommends the following safety tips to avoid a CO related emergency:

- Have your heating system, including chimneys and vents, inspected and serviced annually.
- Ensure chimney flues are completely opened when fireplaces are in use.
- Never use a gas appliance to heat your home.
- Do not use unvented, fuel-burning space heaters indoors. All fuel-burning appliances should be fully vented to the outdoors.

- Never use a gas or charcoal grill inside your home or in a garage.
- Never use a generator inside homes, garages or crawlspaces, even when using fans or opening doors and windows for ventilation.
- Never leave a vehicle, snow blower or lawnmower running in an attached garage, even when the garage door is open.

By knowing the symptoms of CO poisoning and following these safety tips, you can protect yourself and your family from the dangers of CO exposure. •

Throughout this school year our district has transitioned between full remote instruction and hybrid instruction a handful of times. For those of you who are not familiar, we also have students who have remained “Virtual” the entire year as a part of the Westerville Virtual Academy (WVA). Now, beginning on March 8th, we plan to transition to having Cohort A & B “Together Again”. The goal throughout the entire school year has been to keep students safe and healthy (both physically and mentally), deliver high quality instruction, and provide a positive, enjoyable school experience. ## Huber Ridge’s Positive Student Care

We appreciate all of the hard work parents have put in for almost a year now, with supporting Huber Ridge’s students in their academic growth each day. Huber Ridge teachers and staff have been working tirelessly to support students with their learning in this unprecedented environment. With all the uncertainties and changes that this school year has brought, our Huber Ridge families have stepped up and accepted the challenge! Each day teachers, students, and parents are navigating learning environments that they have never known before and find themselves flexing and building their technology muscles, which will help us all when the world goes back to a more predictable structure. With all the twists and turns the last year has thrown at us, we couldn’t be more proud of our Huber family and the perseverance they have shown this year!

One of the most important things we can do when working with our students is provide them with a structured work environment that allows them to be focused and engaged during their time of learning, but also allows for them to be kids. Set up a special space for them to work within your home that is free of distractions to the best of your ability. Even encourage them to “make it their own”, a space where they take ownership of their materials, much like they do with their desk in the classroom. Follow a daily schedule whenever possible. Routine is so important and something that naturally happens within the walls of

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a school building daily. Work with your child to create a schedule for their day/week. This will allow them to take some ownership, but will also help them focus on the daily tasks necessary to be successful in school. Elementary students find themselves transitioning multiple times a day when in school. This is important to encourage at home as well! Incorporate brain breaks, walks around the house, small outdoor breaks when weather is permitting, or some good old fashion quick exercises like jumping jacks or stretches help to break up the sitting that is happening each day. By encouraging all of these things for remote learning you are supporting your student and their learning each day. It is important to support them, but also important for us to support YOU! If you are experiencing issues at home or struggles connected to your student and their remote week learning, please let us know. We are more than happy to help you and work together to try to figure out a solution.

All staff members at Huber Ridge place a significant emphasis on students learning to manage their stress and emotions. Some of that work is a natural part of the day such as good teacher-student communication and classroom structure. Staff also value teaching students breathing and calming activities that they can do on their own inside or outside of the classroom. Here are a few of our favorites for you to try at home.

### **Hot Cocoa Breath**

Simply model and encourage your child to imagine they have a cup of hot cocoa in their hands. Do three rounds of breath instructing them to breathe in by smelling the cocoa and breathe out by blowing gently to cool the cocoa. Please remember to encourage slow and even breathing.

### **Rainbow Breath**

Model and encourage your child to imagine that they will create a rainbow during this breathing exercise. Your arms start at the side of your body and as you breath in, arms go up in a rainbow shape on either side of your body. As you breathe out, arms come down also forming a rainbow. Three or more rounds of slow and even breathing are recommended for this exercise.

### **Tracing Breath**

Place one hand out in front of your face and use the pointer finger of the other hand to trace your fingers. Begin at the base of your thumb and breath in as you trace up your fingers, then breathe out as you trace down each finger. As with all breathing exercises, the slower and more even the breath the better. You can do as many rounds of this breathing exercise as you like.

## Door to Door Salespersons

As the weather is getting (a bit) warmer, we're bound to start seeing the door-to-door salespeople trying to sell us new security systems, windows, roofs, etc. Here are a few reminders for dealing with them:

Try placing a "No Soliciting" sign in a prominent location if you don't want to be bothered. Most of the reputable salespersons will respect that sign.

Every company who meets the ORC definition of Transient Vendors must register with the Blendon Township Police Department before they start going door-to-door and will have a temporary permit that they can show you. The exception to this is non-profits, such as scouts and schools.

You don't have to open the door to anyone. And you definitely don't have to (and probably shouldn't) let them inside your home.

If you ever encounter a solicitor who makes you uncomfortable, doesn't have a permit, or you aren't sure they do, please call the Blendon Police at (614) 889-9494 for assistance. One of their friendly officers will come and talk to the solicitor. •

Food is packaged and bagged for pick up on appointment date. Pick up is between 4:30 pm and 6pm M-F. Contact-free pick up.
