### **New Property Maintenance Code**

In October, our trustees adopted a property maintenance code. The International Property Maintenance Code is a 30-page book recognizing and addressing the need for a modern, upto-date code governing the maintenance of existing buildings.

On December 10, Blendon Township Trustees appointed Bryan Rhoads the Director of Code Enforcement to oversee, implement, and enforce the new housing code.

This new code will affect everyone who resides in Blendon Township. The property code addresses several areas from grass height of 8 inches maximum to parked cars to gutters and more. While it cleans up rentals and abandoned homes, it also will address every home. Eventually it should keep our community looking good-inviting new residents and raising our home values.

The enforcement will take some time as violators can end up in court for non-compliance, be fined, etc.

### OAWC, PUCO, and Your Water Bill

In November 2007, Ohio American Water Company (OAWC) applied for another increase to raise your rates (water bill). On November 14, 2008, the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) approved the opinion and order to raise your water bill.

A lot of things happened in between these dates. Over 130 residents wrote letters opposing this increase. Approximately 500 signatures on petitions were submitted to the rate case, and numerous residents attended and spoke at the PUCO public hearing here at Faith Covenant Church in Blendon Township.



Then came the stipulation and agreement signed by all parties intervening in this increase. The stipulation and agreement was submitted on September 4, 2008. It took the PUCO over two months to rubber stamp their approval on the agreement and issue an opinion and order. As I had stated back in September, I had anticipated that the PUCO would wait until after the elections to approve this; and guess what—they did. The approved rates quoted from the order are as follows for Franklin County:

In the 23-page PUCO opinion and order are some very notable paragraphs which I will copy word for word here: **Page 4:** 

II. Summary of the Hearings

More than 170 letters, petitions, and other correspondence were filed in this docket by Ohio-American customers and public officials in opposition to the proposed rate increase. Most of the comments relate to the amount or percentage of the proposed increase and the frequency of Ohio-American rate increases, given that this proceeding marks the third rate case in five years, and the company representatives have indicated the need to file yet another after this case has been decided.

#### I suggest you read the last sentence again.

#### **Page 14:**

(B) <u>Minimum Amount Owed for Disconnection</u> Ohio-American agrees that it will not physically disconnect a customer's service unless the amount owed is more than \$75. The Company will, however, continue its collections calls for the amount owed.

## I find this amusing; OAWC states the average customer usage is 7 ccf. This equates to \$111 a month for 7 ccf; \$75 is less than 2/3 of the average monthly bill.

There are several orders in this approval but none that I find very relevant to OAWC customers.

As you read in the page 4 quote, we realize there will be another rate increase application soon from OAWC. We as customers need more opposition and need to change our game plan. Please stay tuned to your HRAA; as these details are worked out and become available, we will get them to you. ### Police/HRAA Cooperation on Recent Burglaries

Within recent months, some residents living in the Huber Ridge area of Blendon Township were victims of a disturbing crime trend. A stealthy but bold criminal entered the homes of residents while they were sleeping and robbed them of their personal property.

When a crime pattern was recognized, the Blendon Township Police Department issued a Crime Alert flyer for the community and called upon the Huber Ridge Block Watch to assist in distributing these flyers door to door. The flyers proved to be a key turning point as the citizens recognized the need to contact the Blendon Township Police with any tips related to residential burglaries. These tips resulted in the identification and subsequent arrest of the person responsible for the crimes.



### Grant for New Mobile Data Computers

This past fall, the Blendon Township Police Department was awarded seven Mobile Data Computers and docking stations for our police cruisers through a grant with Franklin County Emergency Management and Homeland Security. These computers saved the Township thousands of dollars that would have been spent on these necessary tools. These computers have enabled our officers to have online reporting right from their cruisers and have been a great convenience to each of them.

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Some have said there are rats in Huber Ridge. If there are, should we treat rat infestations any differently than we treat mice infestations? According to Mike Adair of the Franklin County Board of Health, <u>the presence of rats</u> <u>should be handled differently because of the potential health</u> <u>threat posed by rats</u>. They carry diseases such as plague, hantavirus pulmonary syndrome (HPS), murine typhus, eosinophilic meningitis, food poisoning, leptospirosis, and rat bite fever. If you think you have rats, rather than just trap the rats and assume the problem is resolved, contact and involve the Franklin County Board of Health. The registered sanitarians are trained to assess the situation, educate, intervene, and—if needed—help in elimination. In assessing a situation, it could be that a surrounding property is a contributor of the rat infestation. The health department can properly address the issues related to the rat infestation. ## How to Prevent Rats: (from Ohio Department of Health 2172.32)

- NO FREE MEALS. Don't give the rat a free meal with garbage. Put your garbage (solid waste: food, soiled diapers, dog feces, etc.) in a solid trash can with a tight-fitting lid. Without a lid, you are giving the rat or other vermin a free meal and encouraging their presence. Lid it and ensure it is hauled away weekly. Don't give the rat a free meal with your pet food or pet feces. Clean up feces daily. If you store pet food outside, use metal tins with tight-fitting lids. Clean up uneaten pet food.
- NO FAMILIES. Don't give the rat a place to raise a family. One pair of rats equals 50 babies a year. Rats like to live in piles of wood, rubbish, leaves, ashes, and debris; old boxes and lumber; rags and old piles of paper; discarded chairs and bedding; abandoned automobiles. Raise stored materials a minimum of 12 inches off the ground.
- NO PLACE TO HIDE. Don't give the rats a place to hide. They like dark, enclosed spots where you cannot clean regularly such as double walls, wooden floors in basements, staircases, wooden sidewalks, boxed-in plumbing, closed platforms under furniture; enclosed decks or outdoor buildings that have not been rodent proofed; and open basement drains. Rip out these dead spaces or rodent-proof them. Basement drains should be covered with hardware cloth or a drain cover with openings less than 1/2 inch in diameter. Clean out attics, store rooms, basements, garages, etc.
- ▶ <u>NO HOUSE GUESTS</u>. Don't let rats get into your house. Doors should be no more than 3/8 inches from the frame. If rotted or gnawed, use metal channels or flashing to fix. Basement windows should fit tightly and have no broken panes. In foundation walls, all openings within 30 inches of the ground should be rat-stopped with metal collars or shields or filled in with masonry.
- NO RATS. Kill rats, poison rats, exterminate rats. The safest rat-killing baits you can buy are sold in most hardware, discount, or grocery stores. Be sure to follow directions on labels.

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Remember that rats move closer to the food sources. Survey property and eliminate favorable conditions that promote rat harborage and proliferation. <u>In areas where</u> <u>infestations have been identified</u>, the Board can and will <u>enforce Rodent Regulation</u>. For example, a resident could be ordered to rodent-proof a shed or clean up debris. Keep in mind that the Franklin County Board of Health should not be considered the panacea for rat problems—you may need an exterminator.
