Now for some good news: The Ridge made the front page of the *Dispatch Metro* a few weeks ago (although the County got the headline). The article told of the winning efforts of the Ridge residents to rid the Ridge of the abandoned house on Makassar.

One more bit of good news: The Franklin County Auditor's web site has rated communities by three classes—"Improving" as the highest, "Stable" as the middle, and "Transition" as the lowest. Huber Ridge is rated as "Improving" which is defined as "the stage in the life cycle of a neighborhood when growth is occurring, the time frame when a neighborhood gains public favor and acceptance, a time period in which demand is increasing." **How about that?** You can have a few days to tout that achievement, but we have more work to do. So next week will you send me your dues?

Very soon you will hear about the plans we have to give Association members special benefits at some of the Ridge events! You'll be given a button to show that you and those in your household are members, and that will give you a special opportunity. Street Safety for Spring—Where Can Children (and Adults) Play?

Spring is here; children are anxious to be outside, but please do not allow your children to play in the street. It is against the law. Ohio Revised Code 4511.50 prohibits playing games; e.g., catch, basketball, and football, or obstructing or even standing on any roadway. Please do not set up hoops on a curb or tree lawn or in your driveway **for road use**, even if you live on a court. It becomes a hazard for drivers and could result in serious injury or death.

The law is not limited to children.

Where can children (or adults) play? Huber Ridge Elementary School has basketball hoops and other amenities that facilitate recreation. If your child is older and can get there on his/her own (with your permission), the Vineyard Church on Cooper Road has basketball hoops available for use. Faith Covenant Church, 3607 Dempsey Road, also has basketball hoops available for use. These are places where permission has been granted for daylight use only.

First offenders will be issued a written warning; i.e., a flyer explaining the law and the consequences of breaking the law. A list of those warned will be kept and updated on a regular basis. Upon a second contact, any person previously warned may be issued a summons to appear in the appropriate court. For example, children will be required to appear in Juvenile Court downtown.

The law is enforced because in the recent past children have been struck by cars in our township. Fortunately, their injuries were neither fatal nor severe. We are not willing to take the risk that perhaps the next time, someone will be seriously injured or killed. Please do not let your children play in the street. It is unsafe, and it is against the law.

After visiting some of the area businesses, I will then write an article for our newsletter, *The Herald*, to let residents know what they have to offer.

Well, on Thursday, February 26, 2009, I began my quest by visiting Roush Honda Used Car Company on Westerville Road. I interviewed Mr. Tracy Robb, the Sales Manager, who has worked at Roush Honda Used Car Company for five years. Here are some of the questions that I asked Tracy and his answers:

Come to the Ridge-a-Palooza on May 30!





What's the Latest Buzz About Heartworm Disease?

We've all heard about heartworm disease; but what is it, can both dogs and cats get it, and how is it prevented? I'll attempt to cover the lengthy topic of heartworm disease by

hitting the important take-home points that all pet owners should know.

First, let's consider the heartworm itself. As its name implies, the adult heartworm (Dirofilaria immitis) is a large roundworm that can reach nearly 14 inches long! It has a complex life cycle which requires 2 hosts for completion: dogs and mosquitoes. The adult heartworm takes up housekeeping in the heart and pulmonary arteries of dogs; and when it reproduces, larval stages enter the bloodstream. Mosquitoes bite the infected dog and pick up larvae; and then after further larval developmental stages, the mosquitoes can pass infective-stage larvae to new, vulnerable dogs. These larvae then migrate to the heart and develop into adults. Some parts of the country have a very low incidence of the parasite while other parts have severe heartworm problems. For heartworms to become problematic, there must be mosquitoes, warm weather, infected dogs or other wildlife, and vulnerable host dogs in the area. Here in Central Ohio, we have all the necessary ingredients; and therefore we have quite a high incidence of heartworm disease.

How does heartworm affect our dogs? Adult heartworms actually prefer to live in the pulmonary arteries where they are nourished by the dog's blood as it circulates by. When multiple worms are present—and there can be many in a single dog—they can't all fit in the artery and so back up into the right ventricle of the heart. This decreases the amount of blood the heart can hold and pump. Let's say we have an average 40-pound dog. If this dog is infected with 25 worms or more, the worms begin to back up into the heart. If 50 worms are present, they completely fill the right ventricle of the heart and begin to back up into the right atrium (the upper chamber). When 100 worms are present, "caval syndrome" develops in which hardly any blood can be pumped. Few dogs survive this.

How do we know if a dog has heartworm disease? There are two types of tests that veterinarians use to detect heartworms, both requiring blood samples from your dog. One type looks for the presence of *microfilariae* (immature worms) and the other, newer type detects adult worm proteins. Since it takes between 5 to 7 months for adults to develop and reproduce after initial infection, puppies less than 5 to 7 months old do not need to be tested. All other dogs should be tested on a schedule recommended by your veterinarian. It is important to know that no adult dog should be placed on heartworm medication without first being tested for heartworm.

How do we prevent and treat heartworm disease? Prevention is the key, and it is accomplished by medications that kill off freshly introduced larval stages before they can mature into adults. There are many products on the market now that are available by prescription from your vet. You can

select a product that fits with your lifestyle, ranging from daily dosing, monthly dosing, or even semi-annual dosing. Some medications are given orally, some topically, and others by injection. You and your vet can decide on the best choice for you and your pet. Treating heartworm disease is not as easy as preventing it and the medications can be costly and treatment can take up to a year. The secondary effects of heartworm disease can cause permanent, irreversible heart damage even after the worms are gone.

What about cats? Cats can indeed get heartworm infection; but because the cat is not a natural host for heartworms, the disease presents differently. The heartworm larvae are programmed to seek out canine heart proteins, and this guides them in their migration. If they are instead placed in a cat, they can migrate all around in the body and essentially be "lost." They can cause a tremendous amount of tissue reaction and inflammation wherever they end up. Some may make it to the heart, but even those generally do not grow to normal adult size and rarely reproduce. So in dogs, heartworm disease is a true cardiovascular disease; but in cats, it is more a disease of inflammation anywhere in the body. Feline heartworm disease is 100 percent preventable, and there are numerous medications on the market all available through prescription from your vet.

The weather in Central Ohio can get warm enough for mosquitoes to pop out as early as March. Current recommendations are that our pets should be on heartworm preventative year round in Ohio. Let's get a jump on the heartworm season by making sure all our canine and feline family members are protected!

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Huber Ridge History

[Editor's note: The winter 2008 publication of *The Herald* reported a meeting on January 25, 2008, of a talk by Almina Smock-Wiebell presented on the history and beginnings of Huber Ridge and the surrounding areas. The first article based on this talk was published in *The Herald* in the spring of 2008; the second, in the summer of 2008; and the third, in the autumn of 2008. The winter 2009 issue featured her story on the Faith Covenant Church, which serves our community so well. This article, also written by Huber Ridge's unofficial historian, Almina Smock-Wiebell, tells about Operation Traffic Light, the Recreation Program, Block Parties, the Police and Fire Departments, and the Senior Center.]

Operation Traffic Light!!!

In September 1970, I was appointed to research ways and means of solving the safety problem of Huber Ridge School at the intersections of Paris and Buenos Aires Blvd. Our student enrollment was 576 students at that time. Forced to drop grades, we only had kindergarten to 3rd grade with one 4th grade. The children were not old enough to meet Safety Patrol requirements. The Township Police tried to be at these corners each morning to help remedy the situation! Together with Stanley Bohorek, Principal of Huber Ridge School and Tim Kenny, a member of the Huber Ridge PTA and legal counsel for same, we met with the Superintendent of Schools at that time, Mr. McDermott.

We learned while certain codes prohibited them from helping with a traffic light device, they were obligated to assist by providing crossing guards at this intersection and to pay for same. So from October 26, 1970, until the traffic light was installed, that is what transpired.

On October 16, 1970, myself, Tim Kenny, and Mick Dawson, President of Huber Ridge Civic Association at that time, attended the Blendon Township Trustees meeting along with a number of concerned parents. We requested that the Township pass a proposal to install the traffic light. All the necessary information was made available, including a survey to be taken by the County Division of Traffic. Our proposal was not taken enthusiastically! Heated discussions ensued, and we were told the Township did not have the funds!!! It became a challenge I had to take! So I proposed that myself personally, the PTA, and the Civic Association would collect from the residents half the cost of the traffic light; and the Township would pay the other half. Otherwise, I personally would run for Township Trustee in the hopes of ensuring better funding and cooperation for these necessary objectives. Of course, it always helped to express interest in a voting year, which it was. Consequently, the resolution passed that evening. We received wonderful backing from the residents, the community, businesses, etc.

It was great!!! We reached our goal. Some money contributed by the Huber Ridge School staff was given as a memorial gift for Jo Claire Miller, a deceased teacher. The traffic light was installed exactly one month and one day, November 16, 1970, after we met with the Trustees, who raised the other half of the cost of the traffic light.

"OPERATION TRAFFIC LIGHT" was written up in *The Public Opinion* as one of the top stories of 1970!

One funny thing—people for some reason thought I actually operated the traffic light from my home!!! Many calls came in asking that I put the light on flashing at certain hours.

The installation of the traffic light at the Buenos Aires and Paris Blvd. location led to the County Commissioner at that time and myself conducting a survey which led to the installation of the traffic light at the corner of Cairo and Dempsey Roads for the safety of the children from that location.

The Recreation Program

It seemed we just successfully completed "Operation Traffic Light," and I was in charge of a committee to look into a recreation program for the ever increasing number of children in our community.

In November 1971 we started with a meeting in my home with key individuals: the Township Clerk; the President of the Civic Association; the President of the Westerville Area Civitan; the Huber Ridge PTA; representatives of each area in Huber Ridge, Glengary, Fox Chase, and Hunt Club; and Dick Rano, Recreation Director for Westerville. Each group mentioned contributed \$300 for a total of \$900 to get started with the program. The Blendon Township Trustees helped to finance the needed equipment and to pay the hired co-directors. We were allowed to use the Park as well as Huber Ridge School grounds. Proper insurance was arranged, volunteer parents worked with the directors, the Girl Scouts served as babysitters for the volunteer parents, and the men were trained by a naturalist from the Columbus Metropolitan Parks to conduct nature walks.

Once again, the community came together; and with much planning and preparation and man hours, the Recreation Program began the summer of 1972!! It was so well attended that starting the next year our area was included in the Westerville Recreation Program!!! (Still today, my children and grandchildren call Ridgewood Park "Mom's Park" or "Grandma's Park."

Block Parties

Block parties were popular in the areas. "Family Night" at the movies—through the efforts of Glenn Ackerman of Paris Blvd., N.—of Glengary ran six weeks in the summer. Families would bring blankets, snacks, and drinks to watch the shows. Later we incorporated it into our "recreation program."

Blendon Township Police Department

Through the efforts of Ken Noble, Blendon Township Trustee, our police department was initiated with one part-time policeman in 1965.

In 1967, the first Chief of Police was hired—Donald L. Champ.

By 1971, two full-time policemen were in the Department—Chief Bob Schumaker and Pete Foreman. Four auxillary policemen put in many volunteer hours to protect our areas. They were Harry Schwend (4 years), Richard Clapman (2 1/2 years), Herbert Keipe (4 months), and Dick Fisher (4 months). There were two police cruisers.

In 1971, the first police levy was presented to the Township by Mr. McVay, Chairman of the Civic Association, and myself, Co-chairman; the levy passed with flying colors.

In 1973, Tom Heichel became Police Chief; he held that position for the longest time and was perhaps the best known chief. The Police Department grew to a 15-man department (7 full-time and 8 reserve officers) with 5 modern equipped police cars in which to provide 24-hours-a-day, 7-days-a-week protection.

In early 1980, police operations were moved to a fully updated facility at 6340 Hempstead Road.

In 1981, the second police levy was passed. Also in 1981, Chief Heichel left the Department for approximately eight months and then again later on for another period of time. During his absences, we had three Police Chiefs—Oliver Harris, Marion Alex, and Keith Thatcher. Fortunately for the Township and its residents, Chief Heichel returned as Police Chief, retiring on April 13, 2004. He led the Township Department with 24 officers—12 full time—with 11 cruisers and 4 unmarked vehicles.

Presently John Belford is our Police Chief. While he is doing military service, Lieutenant Dustin Lephart is acting as Chief. There are now 10 regular police officers, 6 parttime officers, 1 reserve officer, 10 police cruisers, 2 reserve cruisers, and 2 unmarked vehicles.

In August 2008, Director of Code Enforcement Bryan Rhodes was designated to enforce property maintenance codes.

Blendon Township Fire Department

For most of the existence of Huber Ridge and surrounding areas, fire and medical service has been furnished by the combined efforts of Westerville and Blendon Township.

In 1970 or 1971, Blendon Township was contracted with Galena to provide fire protection throughout the entire Township. We were also contracted with Minerva Park to provide ambulance service.

In 1973, a movement to establish an independent fire station in the Township ensued. Citizen committees were formed for pro and con. Much controversy occurred. A levy for this purpose was defeated!

When a second levy passed, the building of a Blendon Township Fire Station was made possible. Located at 6350 Hempstead Road, it was dedicated in July, 1979. The Township entered into a contract with the City of Westerville to provide equipment and manpower to operate this facility.

The current fire station located on Schrock and Hempstead Road opened in 2004. It has ten full-time and ten part-time salaried firemen! Headed by Chief Bernard Ingles, the firehouse serves Westerville and Blendon Township.

Senior Center

The Blendon Senior Center was dedicated in July 1974 with additions built on in 1991-1992 and in 2005-2006. The Center recently acquired a new bus, which seats 26 people including the driver.

The current staff of the Senior Center includes Director Donna Jordan, Program Coordinator Charel Bowman, Receptionists Sandra Daugherty and Rita Hollandsworth, and Drivers Keith Jordan and Tim Rector.

The 2009 Senior Center Advisory Council members are President Libby Bryan, Vice President David Quast, Secretary Dottie Rector, Jerry Boone, Trish Burnside, Paul Christopoulos, Jim Ellis, Dot O'Donnell, Sarah Rhodes, Della Walter, and Bertie Yarnell.
