### Do you dread spring cleaning? Here's an alternative! Help Clean Up Ridgewood Park on April 24!







This year's block watch training held in January was a triple bonus for approximately 25 residents.

Battalion Chief John Bokros of Westerville/Blendon Fire Division gave us lessons and literature on smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, emergency planning and disaster preparedness, and fire escape plans and practice. The personal touch and advice he offered was invaluable. His willingness to serve and his enthusiasm were apparent and inspiring.

Department put together a training manual that contained a one-page summary of how to prevent crime with the acronym "S.T.O.P. T.H.I.E.F." (see huberridge.org for the summary); an identity theft "repair kit" from Ohio Attorney General Richard Cordray's office (a very comprehensive booklet); a document prepared by Franklin County Children Services about child abuse and neglect; and safety tips for runners and walkers. All of these offered a wealth of useful information. He interacted with us and gave us scenarios to challenge our thinking about safety. In keeping with his tradition, he generously awarded one fortunate resident a \$25

## Update on the OAWC Rate Increase Application

Here we are in the midst of the third rate increase application in as many years. This time Steve Kennedy, Prairie Township Trustee, and I have united the communities serviced by the Ohio American Water Company by forming and co-chairing respectively Fight the Hike Ohio and by including the best practices of other states' opposition to the frequent and exorbitant rate hikes.

Our collected and organized opposition to the OAWC's rate increase request has opened a few doors this year. We have received some attention from a few state representatives, and House Bill 344 has been introduced. This bill limits the amount a water utility can apply for in reimbursement from its customers for attorney fees and fees related to the cost of each application to 50 percent of the increase. The other 50 percent must be absorbed by the stockholders. This is a start and not the answer. While we have some elected state lawmakers' attention, the letters of support for House Bill 344 and stories related to OAWC's abuse must continue.

Ultimately OAWC needs to go, but it is not that easy. A lot of things must happen to pave the way. As long as

American Water Company caters to the stockholders, the prices their "hostages" (i.e., customers) pay and the quality of services will not change. This would mean a new business structure from not just OAWC but also from AWC (OAWC's parent company.)

This is not a vendetta against OAWC; this is our community's ability to invite good residents to move here. Recently the HRAA honored residents who have lived here for 25-plus years with a dinner. There are many great stories as to why Huber Ridge residents have lived here for so long: the community, the people, the amenities, etc. And there are only two complaints: the water bills and services and the number of rentals.

OAWC is the source of both complaints. As long as OAWC's business model doesn't change or our water/ sewer supplier doesn't change, our ability as a community to invite good neighbors and good neighborhood businesses will suffer. The values of our homes won't increase as they should, and more investors will buy homes here for rentals.

I ran for president of your HRAA to unite the community for the betterment of the community. In the past four years, we (the community) have united for several causes and made a difference here. OAWC's pricing and water quality is a big detriment, and we as customers have the tools to change that: a pencil/pen and paper and the power of the vote. Our local and state lawmakers are supposed to be elected for the people by the people. 
