## Just 44 Votes ...

Just 44 votes determined who will serve as our Blendon Township Trustee for the next four years.

Below is a summary of the election results specific to Blendon Township for the police renewal levy and the Fiscal Officer/Trustee positions followed by brief commentary.

The Blendon Township police levy renewal passed.

1,812 or 72.95 percent voted yes

672 or 27.05 percent voted no

0 over-votes (mis-votes)

63 under-votes (63 did not vote yes or no for the renewal)

Wade Estep will continue as our Fiscal Officer for the next four years. He was running unopposed. Results: 1,990 or 100 percent voted yes

0 over-votes (mis-votes)

1,265 under-votes (voters who did not vote for Mr. Estep)

Our trustee for the next four years will be James F.

**Welch.** Liz Ward opposed James Welch for the position and lost by 44 votes or 1.54 percent.

1,400 votes or 49.23 percent for Liz Ward

1,444 votes or 50.77 percent for James F. Welch

2 over-votes (these are improper votes such as voting for both candidates)

409 under-votes (this is a count of those who submitted a ballot but did not vote for either candidate)

James Welch has been our trustee since June 24, 2010, when Judge Alan Acker appointed him to the position. He has been President of the Huber Ridge Area Association since 2005.

Blendon Township's population is approximately 9,337; and an estimated 4,400 are registered voters. Total township votes cast for this election were 3,255 for the elected officials (including under-votes) and 2,547 for the police renewal

These 708 were votes from residents in the Village of Minerva Park for our elected officials. The Village of Minerva Park is part of Blendon Township but has its own police department; therefore, Village residents do not vote on Blendon Township police issues.

More than half of registered Blendon Township voters (2,844) cast their vote for the Trustee position. This election clearly demonstrated how much our votes matter. Thank you for voting.

## **Meet the Carey Family**





# Enhancing the Jewel in Your Backyard!

When Mr. Huber laid out this community, he realized there was an area that couldn't be developed. It was a valley that had a stream, Spring Run, cutting through the landscape. That area we know as Ridgewood Park today. This park has become a lovely place where people can gather to play baseball, have a picnic, play on the playground, or take a walk through the woods.

We're very fortunate to have people who care about its preservation and continue to improve and maintain it. We need to thank Boy Scout Troop 560 and W.A.R.M. for their projects there in September and October.



Collin Slone's Eagle project and W.A.R.M.'s Day of Service project were both on September 10. Collin and the Scouts moved a portion of the path in the woods in two separate places. The first section was on the west loop, where one edge had eroded into Spring Run. It was necessary to move it before Halloween since we planned to have the haunted woods again and didn't want any mishaps. The second section was on the east loop where the rain had washed the path away over the years. It was in a low spot and remained very muddy there.

W.A.R.M. wanted to give back to the community since it had used the Park this summer for its lunch program. Many volunteers helped paint the toys, the picnic tables, and the shelter and did general beautification work—all of which gave the Park an extra layer of protection before winter!

The second Eagle Scout project was performed by Conor Paine-O'Brien. If you've ever entered the Park on the east end from Bashaw, you'll know the steps there needed to be replaced for quite some time. It was a major undertaking, which required a brave Scout to take it on! Conor stepped up and did a fantastic job there. He installed the new wood and shored the steps.
