Occasionally we have cases that require the use of a motion-activated hidden camera. Whether it is a newspaper that keeps disappearing off of a porch or a gate that keeps getting opened, you never know when a camera could be of use.



If you have a problem that you don't want to buy a camera for, you just need one to find out what's going on, call 614.882.8500 and ask for Detective Phillips (Day) or Detective Moore (Evenings). As long as it is an appropriate use of the equipment with a corresponding police report, our Detective will install and retrieve the camera and process the photos. It does not have to be a crime. It might just be a mystery that is troubling your peace of mind (Information Report). Sometimes raccoons do amazing things. But it is better to know that it is a

raccoon (or the wind) rather than having to worry about it possibly being a prowler.



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#### **Kids Lunch Club returns for its 4th year!**

Another reason to look forward to summer is the Westerville Area Kids Lunch Club! The Kids Lunch Club is a FREE program that provides children 18 and under with nutritious meals and coordinated enrichment activities throughout the summer when school is not in session. The KLC began in the summer of 2011 at our own Ridgewood Park, and has successfully expanded to eight programs in various parts of Westerville. In 2014, 18,280 lunch meals and 25,980 weekend meals were supplied to children in need, totaling 43,960 meals. Additionally, KLC distributed over 63,000 pounds of fresh produce at the sites.

This upcoming summer, the Kids Lunch Club will serve from 11:15am to 12:00pm from May 26<sup>th</sup> through August 7<sup>th</sup> at our own Ridgewood Park. This program is outdoors and is rain or shine.

Who can eat at the Kids Lunch Club?

- Children 1-18 may eat lunch at a KLC Site.
- Students enrolled in school with an IEP (individualized education program) up to age 21 may also eat at a KLC site
- Adults should not expect to receive a meal at the site.

My child has a food allergy or intolerance, what other options are there for my child?

• Unfortunately, the only substitute we can offer is soy milk for lactose intolerant children. Please tell the site supervisor if you would like to order soy instead. The rest of the lunch will still contain lactose in things like cheese or other dairy products.

Do you enjoy the great outdoors, face painting, crafts, exercise and fitness, gardening, nutrition and other extracurricular activities? We invite you to become a mentor and share your passion with children in our local community. 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## **Spring/Summer Code Enforcement**

Spring and summer start the grass cutting season. This is to remind all residents or let new residents know that Blendon Township code requires grass and weeds to not exceed 8 inches.

Noxious weeds are prohibited. For a list of prohibited State of Ohio Noxious weeds

see <a href="https://plants.usda.gov/java/noxious?rptType=State&statefips=39">https://plants.usda.gov/java/noxious?rptType=State&statefips=39</a>. Notable on the list are various thistles.

Even though Blendon Township code allows a maximum grass/weed height of 8 inches, we strongly encourage you to cut your grass before grass/weeds reach that height. High grass/weeds invite undesirable creature habitats and will also ensure a visit from code enforcement. Please consider your neighbors and the community.

If you are unable to cut your grass for some reason, then please do not hesitate to call Bryan Rhoads 839-2013 or Branch Wayt at 356-9752 and I/he/we will try to get you help.

# **Huber Ridge Blooms Garden Show and Contest set for July 12, 2015**

Huber Ridge Blooms – For those who are new to the Huber Ridge area, your HRAA, Inc. has sponsored a free garden show and contest called "Huber Ridge Blooms" every July since 2008. This event provides the opportunity to showcase the great gardens and landscaping of hard-working Huber Ridge residents to the public. It is a judged event and is presently open to all adult residents of the Huber Ridge area, owner or renter. (One exception to this: Previous winners from 2014 and 2013 should abstain from entry in order to allow others the opportunity.)

**History** – Stewart Flaherty, our Blendon Township trustee, is the mastermind behind this event and is the Honorary Chairman. Stewart is also a benefactor of the contest and has provided the first place prize of a \$100 home improvement store gift card for the last seven years. Because Stewart loves beautification and is quite the gardener himself, he suggested we begin such a contest and call it "Blendon Blooms."

**Sunbury Woods Invited** – In an attempt to be inclusive of more Blendon Township areas, we are expanding the contest to include our Sunbury Woods neighbors. We have invited Sunbury Woods residents via their Facebook page and will try additional communication venues to encourage their participation. Only then would we change the name of the contest to "Blendon Blooms" and possibly seek to include more areas of the township in 2016.

Contest details – Free entry with a completed application form. Registration is from May 1 - June 26. Tour is open to the public, Sunday, July 12, from 1 – 5pm. Judging for Blooms is simple and the prizes are great: \$100 gift card to a home improvement store for first place; \$50 gift card to Oakland Nursery for second place (this prize is also donated by another regular benefactor and former Blooms winner, Sharon Ricker); and \$35 cash for third place donated by your HRAA. All participants receive gift bags and beautiful certificates specific to their garden. Prizes are awarded at a private Gardener's Reception held the evening of the tour. Details will be provided to contest participants.

New for 2015 Bicentennial Blooms - In celebration of Blendon Township's 200<sup>th</sup> birthday. we are seeking special garden entries that exhibit heritage blooms, plantings inherited from grandparents or generational friend, or gardens with historical or Blendon Township themes. Blooms judges will select the finalists and Blendon Township trustees will choose the winner(s) depending on the number of entries. If you wish to enter the Bicentennial contest, you will still be part of the Huber Ridge Blooms tour that is open to the public and you will also be invited to the private Gardener's Reception where winners are announced. Bicentennial Blooms is open to all adult residents of Huber Ridge and Sunbury Woods, including past winners of **Huber Ridge Blooms.**

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#### **Self Defense Class**

Most generic self defense courses concentrate solely on what to do if a stranger suddenly launches a surprise attack out of the blue. Although that is helpful, most people are assaulted by someone they know. Even if the assailant is a stranger, there are usually warning signs before violence occurs. It's good advice to stay in well-lit areas and not to walk alone at night. But remember, the most likely threat is a known person.

If <u>anyone</u> (and I mean *ANYONE*) makes you feel threatened, uneasy, or uncomfortable, and seem as though they might become violent, **CALL THE POLICE** and leave their presence immediately! Do you leave first or call first? Either or both at the same time.

But don't just move *away* from danger, move *toward* safety. Go toward trusted persons or places or, if in a business or public place, get close to employees or staff and tell them to CALL THE POLICE. You are NEVER bothering the police. Your safety is the reason Police Departments exist. Nobody is a better judge of when you are in danger than you. Many say, "But what if I'm wrong?" It's no big deal to be wrong if you are really worried about violence and not just making prank calls. We respond to false alarms all the time and we would rather go to 100 false alarms than have one person who needs us hesitate to call. What if you are right?

For more information on the warning signs of violence I highly recommend the book, *The Gift of Fear*, by Gavin DeBecker.

Some interesting facts about Blendon Township by Almina R. Smock-Weibel:

- The first settlers were Edward Phelps and Isaac Griswold who were originally from Windsor, Conn. They built log cabins, planted wheat and Griswold planted an orchard.
- March 6, 1815 our township was first named Harrison Township.
- December 8, 1824 it was renamed Blendon Township.
- In 1840 the population was 972.
- The township consisted of 2 towns: 1839 Westerville and in 1849 Amalthea, now known as Central College. Amalthea Historical Society still exists and meets regularly at Central College Church.
- By 1858 the township boasted of 3 post offices with Isaac Griswold as the Postmaster.
- The most prominent religious denominations were Presbyterian, United Brethren and Methodist.
- The first tavern in the township was opened by Frances Olmsted, located at Blendon Corners. The building no longer exists. However, not far from the Blendon Corners is the oldest standing structure in the township since 1815. A log cabin and farm owned by the Noble Family. Descendant Ken Noble would later become a townships trustee. The building is now known as Reiner Realty, owned by Walt Reiner.
- The first marriage in the township took place in 1817 between Ethan Palmer and Lovilla Olmstead.
   The 1st baby born in the township was Benjamin Moore in 1807. The 1st death in the township was that of Ethan Palmer in 1818.
- The first lawman in the township was Timothy Lee, a veteran of the War of 1812. It is not known if he was elected or appointed to contain the scoundrels of the township at that time.
- While Edward Phelps was known to cut down the first tree in the township, Charles Huber came to our township and had all the trees cut down in the area now known as Huber Ridge.
- Charles Huber built approximately 1000 homes, starting in 1961, and included sidewalks, street lights and our own Huber Ridge Elementary School.
- In 1962, 3 homes on Cairo Road accommodated 125 students: kindergarten, 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 4<sup>th</sup> graders. Hanby School housed 3<sup>rd</sup> grade and the Minerva Park Elementary School, located on Cleveland Avenue, at the time, also housed some of the students. In 1963, an additional 3 homes, also on Cairo Road served 324 students. In 1964 Huber Ridge Elementary School was finally completed, opening its doors to 478 students. This past November, Huber Ridge School celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. It presently accommodates 550 students, kindergarten to 5<sup>th</sup> grade.

# **Celebrating Blendon Township's Bicentennial (cont.)**

Townships are governed by 3 trustees and one fiscal officer. They are elected in odd numbered years. Our present trustees and fiscal officer are Jan Heichel, Jim Welch, Stewart Flaherty, and Wade Estep.

One of our best known trustees, Jerry Ward, served our area for 26 years. He tragically and unexpectedly died on May 15, 2010. His experience and dedication will long be remembered.



## **Blendon Township Police Department History**

Through the efforts of Ken Noble, a Blendon Township Trustee, our Police department was initiated with one part-time policeman in 1965.

In 1967, Donald L. Champ was hired as the first Police Chief. By 1971, the department had 2 full-time police officers: Chief Bob Schumaker and Officer Pete Foreman. Four auxiliary policemen also served our area.

The first Police Levy was presented to the township in 1971, passing with flying colors!

In 1973 Tom Heichel became Police Chief. He served the longest term, 32 years, and was the best known. In 1981 he left the department for a period of time returning on April 13, 2004. Sadly, former Police Chief Tom Heichel recently passed away on March 20, 2015. He will long be remembered for many good works. More recently, Tom, along with several others, was instrumental in bringing the Concerts in the Park to our community!

Presently we are proud to have Police Chief John Belford serving our community. There are now 17 officers in the Blendon Township Police Department.


