

How To Use The Facebook Search Engine To Find Almost Anything

So, you wake up one morning and find a water leak. You KNOW you need a plumber but who do you call? You remember seeing posts on the Huber Ridge Area Association Facebook page, but WHERE has that post gone now? Frazzled, you begin scrolling and scrolling and scrolling. Well, scroll no more! Use the built in Facebook search to find what you are looking for!

To begin, go to the Huber Ridge Area Association Facebook page and look for the magnifying glass, type in

any keyword(s) as this will pull up past discussions.



Once you master that you are ready to try another neat trick! Expand your horizons and use Facebook's all encompassing search! Look at the very top of your screen for the search bar with the magnifying glass.



Now type in "Huber Ridge plumber" and posts pertaining to all keywords will appear. This allows you to search multiple groups simultaneously as well as your friends that have posted on their individual pages.

Facebook's The "Other" Box

Many people are not aware that Facebook has the "other" box. What is the "other" box? Well, let's say you are trying to join the Huber Ridge Area Association page and one of the administrators is attempting to contact you to verify your address. If you are not Facebook friends then the message likely went to the "other" box. The "other" box is a catch-all for messages from people you are not friends with on Facebook. You cannot access the "other" box from an app or mobile device.

Here is how to check if you have pending messages in your "other" box. Click on the message icon.



Once you click on the icon look at the top and click "Message Requests."



Be sure to look for "see filtered requests" under the last message.

Huber Ridge Elementary Back To School Information

We want to thank all of our students, parents, and families that made this past school year a success. We had many great accomplishments that should be celebrated. Our state report card for the 2014-2015 school year improved greatly; visit the Ohio Department of Education to check it out. Please remember that a grade of 'C' means that students achieved as they should. Any letter grade above a 'C' means that students achieved more than they were supposed to. On top of that, those improvements were accomplished on the PARRC test, which was much harder than the old OAA achievement tests. Huber Ridge Elementary achieved so well that we are no longer in the Ohio Improvement Process, which helps schools focus on closing achievement gaps in students. In the last three years, Huber Ridge has been named a High Progress School of Honor, has raised our achievement on the new state tests, and we have closed our achievement gaps. Great work done by the teachers and students; tremendous community support has made that possible. Thank you to all!

While we want to celebrate our successes, please know that we will never stop working hard to make the community proud of Huber Ridge Elementary School. Another aspect that the school has improved on that affects our academics is our PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions & Support) behavior system. Please visit www.PBIS.org for overviews of the system, as it is different than the traditional 'clip' system. Students are rewarded and praised for positive behavior and the building, as well as each classroom, has various ways to promote student success. We know we can do better and plan on doing that this upcoming school year.

Some important dates for the 2016-2017 School Year: August 9th: Back to School Days; August 17th: Meet the Teacher; August 18th: First Day of School; August 31st: Curriculum Night.

Finally, I would like to thank all of our volunteers who have helped in classrooms and in other ways. You are a necessary part of Huber Ridge Elementary! Also, a big thank you to our Huber Ridge PTA, who truly does a tremendous amount of work for our students and staff!

A Message From The Blendon Township Police Chief

Facebook is only one part of our on-line presence and social media outreach at the Blendon Township Police Department. Our primary web-based tool for reaching the public is our Township website at www.blendontwp.org. This is a great source for all Blendon Township events, services and activities, not just the police department. On the Police page of the Township website you will find our most visited page, the Daily Police Activity Blog, but there is much more than just the daily blog. You can file a police report on-line. Info is also available on Transient Vendors (solicitors), our Township Dog and Parking Ordinances, Sex Offender registration, Vacation House Watch sign up, etc.

When we update our website we try to always post a notice on the various neighborhoods' Facebook pages that there is new information to view. There were a few times that the notice on Facebook did not get posted (for several different reasons). Please realize that if that happens you can still go straight to our website to view the most current info (like the Daily Blog). The blog was updated, only the Facebook notification was not posted.

We also have Township Text alerts, which you can sign up for on the main "Home" page of the Township website. We understand many of you don't like to sign up for text alerts because you don't want your inbox clogged up with every lost cat and bake sale on the planet. I assure you that this text alert is used very sparingly. We average only two or three alerts a year, and mainly for important incidents like school lockdowns or major traffic shutdowns, such as a fatal traffic crash. In the event of an active shooter or a homeland security type real-world crisis in or affecting Blendon Township we would send out a text alert.

We are 100% committed to maintaining a strong presence online, digitally, on social media, websites, and text alerts. It is only through a real partnership with the community, with real two-way dialogue, that we can deliver the full-spectrum of police services that our residents have come to know and expect. We did "community policing" here in Blendon Township before it was ever a catch phrase; serving our residents with a "first name and a handshake". That continues into the age of digital information and social media. Thanks, Chief Belford.

P.S. Don't forget that you are still always welcome to go "low tech" and just call us on the phone or stop by the office!

Rules Of The Road

Because of the unique parking situation we have in the Ridge (2-3 cars per home where a one car garage is the norm), we have had many complaints about where folks are parking, how they are parking and what to do when you approach a parked car with another vehicle driving down the other side of the street. We also have folks who seem bent on ignoring traffic signs (speed limit, stop signs, even traffic lights), so we thought with our beloved children out and about this summer, and with school around the corner, it was time to refresh our knowledge of the vehicle rules in the State of Ohio (which also means they apply in Huber Ridge).

<u>PARKING</u>: A vehicle must be parked **FACING THE DIRECTION OF THE TRAFFIC ON THAT SIDE OF THE STREET** parallel to and not more than 12 inches from the right curb. On one way streets, vehicles may be parked parallel to and not more than 12 inches from the right or left curb.

No person shall stop, **park** or stand a vehicle in any of the following places, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a law enforcement officer or traffic control device:

- 1. On a sidewalk (except a bicycle)
- 2. IN FRONT OF A PUBLIC ** OR** PRIVATE DRIVEWAY
- 3. Within an intersection
- 4. WITHIN 10 FEET OF A FIRE HYDRANT
- 5. On a crosswalk
- 6. WITHIN 20 FEET OF A CROSSWALK OR INTERSECTION
- 7. WITHIN 30 FEET OF A FLASHING BEACON, STOP SIGN OR TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNAL
- 8. Between a safety zone and the adjacent curb or within 30 feet of points on the curb immediately opposite the ends of a safety zone.
- 9. Within 50 feet of the nearest rail of a railroad crossing
- 10. Beside or opposite a street excavation or obstruction when such parking would obstruct traffic
- 11. Alongside a vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street
- 12. On a highway bridge or within a highway tunnel
- 13. At any place where signs prohibit parking
- 14. Within one foot of another parked vehicle
- 15. On a roadway portion of a freeway, expressway or thruway

<u>LANES</u>: Keep to the right. Drive on the right half of the roadway except: (Only the one pertinent to Huber Ridge is listed) When an obstruction makes it necessary for you to drive left-of-center (such as a car parked on one side of the road), YIELD THE RIGHT OF WAY TO ALL VEHICLES TRAVELING IN THE PROPER DIRECTION ON THE UNOBSTRUCTED PORTION OF THE ROAD. In other words, it is not who got there first. If you are driving up Cairo and there is a car parked in your lane, you don't go around it if there is another car approaching from the other direction that does not have a car in their lane. Wait until they proceed, **THEN** drive around the parked vehicle.

Rules Of The Road (Continued)

<u>LIGHTS</u>: Lights must be displayed between sunset and sunrise and during any periods of rain, snow, fog or other unfavorable atmospheric conditions REGARDLESS of the time of day. LIGHTS MUST BE USED WHENEVER WINDSHIELD WIPERS ARE USED.

SPEED LIMITS: Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit is **25 MILES PER HOUR** in a residential area.

SCHOOL ZONE: 20 MPH when passing a school building or grounds (school zones) during school recess and while children are going to or leaving school during the opening and closing hours, and when 20 MPH school speed limit signs are erected.

INOPERABLE TRAFFIC SIGNALS: By law, except when a law enforcement officer is present to direct traffic, drivers must TREAT THE NON-WORKING TRAFFIC SIGNAL AS A FOUR WAY STOP. After stopping, due care should be taken before proceeding through the intersection, as other drivers may wrongfully view the inoperable traffic signal a clearance to proceed without stopping.

So basically, the rules haven't changed that much from when we all took driver's ed back in high school. Remember to use common sense and be aware of your surroundings. Please slow down when you see children playing and bicyclists using the roads. Don't text and drive!

Property Values in Huber Ridge

Jean and I purchased our current home in 2000 toward the end of the robust homes sales period. For a few years afterward our home value increased as other homes did in Huber Ridge. During the height of the recession that followed, our home value dropped below the price we paid. But to my surprise the Franklin County Auditor reported that the Huber Ridge subdivision was rated as one of the best in the county. Even though the homes dropped in value and sales were slow, Huber Ridge homes didn't drop like the rest of the county did.

Now that the housing market is climbing again, sales listed on the auditor's website report Huber Ridge home sales are doing great in comparison - the selling price of our homes has increased and the average home sale in the "Ridge" is reported to be 17 days. I am aware of two homes that sold recently in 1 day, one home that sold in 3 days, and one seller who was offered more than the asking price!

This speaks volumes to you the residents, the community, and the Township. The more we care about and for our community, the better the return on the investment we have in our homes and community.

Although Jean and I are not looking to sell currently, it is very good to know Huber Ridge is in demand for our demographic.

Sidewalks

An Interview with Trustee Jim Welch about our sidewalks:

If your home has a sidewalk, then this article applies to you. It especially applies to you if your sidewalk is in disrepair. You can save yourself money by reading and acting NOW in 2016. Why? The price to replace sidewalks will be renegotiated in January, 2017, and the cost will most likely increase. The Township has been given a special rate for the remaining months of 2016.

Q. It IS the responsibility of the home owner to maintain sidewalks associated with their properties, correct?

A. Yes, the homeowner is responsible for sidewalk maintenance – not the township.

Q. Why will home owners suddenly be required to replace sidewalks starting in 2017?

A. Our addressing this issue is not a sudden decision; the sidewalks have been in disrepair for a long time. Your current trustees have chosen to act on the need to improve the overall township infrastructure and we think most will agree that our sidewalks are in great need of maintenance. Sidewalks are crumbling and are not pedestrian safe for exercise, walking, pushing strollers, etc.

Q. What is the special rate for residents needing sidewalk replacement?

A. The 2016 rate for sidewalk replacement is \$8 per square foot; to replace a driveway the special rate is only \$6 per square foot. This is an incredible deal but you are free to get your own quote. Please keep in mind that contractors must follow the township guidelines for replacement.

Q. How important is sidewalk maintenance to the homeowner and the community?

A. It is very important to both the homeowner and the community – for the homeowner, having a proper sidewalk, that is, one that can be safely navigated without trip hazards, protects the owner from potential liability issues and benefits the owner with increased home value. For the community it promotes safe passage and improves the overall appearance of the community which makes the community more desirable.

- Q. So homeowners needing sidewalk maintenance can expect notification some time in 2017, correct?
- A. Correct, the township will begin notification early 2017.

Q. What if a homeowner gets notified that their sidewalk needs replaced and the home owner simply does not have the money? A. If notified of needed maintenance and the owner has no funds on hand, there are at least three options how to pay: Apply for the township CIC, have the township do the work and your taxes will be billed, or hire a contractor and pay accordingly.

Q. What is the township CIC?

A. From the township website, "The Blendon Township Community Improvement Corporation (CIC) is a nonprofit corporation that was created by the Blendon Township Trustees and Certified by the State of Ohio, Secretary of State in December 2014." The CIC is one way to help pay for sidewalk replacement if qualified. Even if you do not qualify for the grant because of your income please call the township offices. The CIC board may grant requests based upon certain situations.

Q. Can a resident replace his own sidewalk?

A. Our adopted Sidewalk Maintenance Program has specific requirements to follow. A resident would have to adhere to the standards. If the standards are not met, then the resident would be required to comply.

Q. Where can a resident read about the requirements in the Resolution?

A. Blendontwp.org, Departments/Public Service, then select Sidewalk Replacement Program.

Q. Is there anything residents can or should do to promote the upkeep of their sidewalks?

A. Yes, whether you are the owner or a renter, one of the biggest ways to keep a sidewalk (or a street) from crumbling is weed control. Pull the weeds out when they are small. If the weeds get too large it usually indicates a deep root system. Pulling them out when the ground is hard may damage the sidewalk or the street. Better to use an effective weed killer. Take care of your sidewalk – it is not indestructible and is costly to replace.

Sidewalks (Continued)

Some Background:

Sidewalk maintenance is required by the State of Ohio. Maintenance is not a Blendon Township only issue; it is an issue wherever there are sidewalks in the State. What the State does not spell out in their requirement are the methods and specifics of sidewalk maintenance.

On January 28, 2014, Blendon Township Trustees enacted Resolution 201407 which spells out the specifics or who is responsible/accountable for sidewalk maintenance (definitions), what conditions demand replacement (procedures), how property owners will be notified (notification), what will happen if the responsible party does not comply with notification (options for compliance), what responsibility the Township will take (Township responsibility), how the work must be performed (standard for construction, repair and maintenance). References:

*ORC 723.011 Control of sidewalks, curbs, and gutters.

The legislative authority of a municipal corporation, in addition to the powers conferred by sections 729.01 to 729.10, inclusive, of the Revised Code, may require, by ordinance, by the imposition of suitable penalties or otherwise, that the owners and occupants of abutting lots and lands shall keep the sidewalks, curbs, and gutters in repair and free from snow or any nuisance.

Effective Date: 01-01-1962

*ORC 729.01 Construction or repair of sidewalks, curbs, and gutters at expense of owners.

In addition to the power conferred upon municipal corporations under section 727.01 of the Revised Code to construct sidewalks, curbs, or gutters and levy an assessment therefore, the legislative authority of a municipal corporation may require the construction or repair of sidewalks, curbs, or gutters within the municipal corporation by the owners of lots or lands abutting thereon, and upon the failure of such owners to construct or repair such sidewalks, curbs, or gutters within the time prescribed in the resolution adopted under section 729.02 of the Revised Code, may cause such sidewalks, curbs, or gutters to be constructed or repaired and assess the total cost thereof against the lots or lands abutting thereon, notwithstanding the provisions of sections 727.03 and 727.05 of the Revised Code.

Rumpke Reminders

Are you new to The Ridge or just wondering about why Rumpke didn't pick up something you put out for trash pickup this week? Here is a quick list of some of the things you need to know about Rumpke trash, recycling and yard waste pick up in our neighborhood.

- Our pick up day is Friday
- Items for pick up cannot be put down at your curb before 5 p.m. Thursday evening (items that are put at the curb before Thursday or after Friday you may find a notice to remove them from the curb from the township code enforcement).
- Trash can be placed out in properly tied bags or cans. Cans with lids are encouraged so as to not invite a wildlife buffet at your curb!
- Further Rumpke curbside pick-up guidelines are on their website at www.rumpke.com/for-your-home/curbside-guidelines
- Recycling-the township has additional containers and lids if needed. Simply stop by the township complex service department or contact John Giamarco Blendon Township Service Department Director at <u>igiamarco@blendtwp.org</u> or 614-882-2673.
- Acceptable recycling items that can be put in your recycling bins: Plastic bottles and jugs, Glass bottles and jurs, Aluminum cans, Steel cans and lids, Paperboard (like cereal boxes), Cardboard, Office paper, Envelopes and junk mail, Newspapers, magazines and inserts, telephone books and catalogs, and cartons. For additional information on acceptable items for recycling see www.rumpke.com/for-your-home/recycling
- Yard Waste please place leaves and grass clippings in biodegradable bags (NO PLASTIC BAGS) and bundle limbs for collection on your regularly scheduled yard waste day. Bundled limbs should be no longer than 4' in length, no more than a foot in diameter and tied with twine (not wire). Unbundled branches and twigs don't get picked up nor do Christmas trees that are not cut down and bundled.
- Large pick up items: Please contact Rumpke at least 24 hours before your regularly scheduled collection to request a large item pick-up for acceptable large items, and/or excessive amounts of trash. Television sets cannot exceed 32 inches for curbside pick-up. Any mattress or upholstered furniture must be completely sealed in disposable plastic for removal. Additional fees may apply.
