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To the Editor:

The people of Blendon Township got a raw deal when Judge Eric Brown "appointed" our new trustee to replace retiring Township Trustee Bill Bates this last May.

Trustees Jerry Ward and Stewart Flaherty were first in line to choose Bill Bates' replacement. Just like the last time we were faced with a Trustee leaving office prior to term expiration in 2006 (Trustees Bates and Ward deciding at that time), the two Trustees could not agree on a replacement. Two people with two very different agendas not agreeing should surprise no one. That is why there is a process in place of deferring judgment to a judge.

This time, Judge Eric Brown, who received letters of recommendation from Township residents for at least one candidate as well as a letter of recommendation from former Trustee Bill Bates, apparently either refused to do his job or was incompetent to do it. It is perplexing to me that the letters of recommendation were not convincing enough for the judge to determine the will of the people. Maybe there were too many conflicting opinions. Regardless, he

had the resumes of each candidate and, like any person responsible for hiring, should have been able to determine trustee qualifications and should have made the decision independently.

Instead, as I understand it, he called Trustees Ward and Flaherty and told them they had to come up with someone they could agree on. The Trustees apparently could not agree on any of the five applicants, so they came up with someone they could live with for the next several months—until voters get their say in November. Our present trustees chose someone who had not even applied for the open position.

The additional irony of all this is that prior to the appointment, a Public Notice dated and posted May 1, 2009, on the Blendon Township website stated, "The Trustees believe it very important to remain fair and impartial to all applicants. Any appointment they might make could be viewed as an endorsement for that person in the November election. Both Mr. Ward and Mr. Flaherty believe that it is in the voters' best interests to have the campaigns conducted without the perception of such an endorsement." This was presented as their reason for deferring the decision to Judge Brown.

Because Judge Brown "appointed" in this manner, I cannot help concluding that he in essense "forced" our trustees to be unfair and partial in their selection and ultimately "forced" an endorsement.

People of Blendon Township will have an opportunity to get a better deal by deciding for themselves who are the best candidates for Trustee. The Huber Ridge Area Association is sponsoring a Trustee Candidate Question and Answer Session October 6, 6:30 p.m., at Faith Covenant Church, 3607 Dempsey Road. Details at huberridge.org. The two hours spent at the Q & A will make a difference in your next 35,000 hours of township living.

## Déjà vu OAWC

Here they go again! Ohio American Water Company (OAWC) has filed for yet another substantive rate increase. Before I go into details, I want to say that this is the third increase in as many years that I have opposed and led the opposition to defeat. We have had some good results as well as not so good. During these oppositions, we have placed printed inserts in *The Herald*, had yard signs made and

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Anthony and Cory already know! Check out our Senior webpage Why pay triple the cost for the same Quality, Value, and Service? displayed throughout our communities advertising meetings and hearings. The costs to do this are not minimal, but we have been able to contain these costs as well as keeping you informed of the progress and how to oppose the increases. I have been able to acquire funds that have enabled your HRAA to make and post these signs and pay for the cost of the inserts. The donation to the Association to fight the increases has enabled us to use the media resources listed without using your membership dues, leaving your membership dues to go back into the community. For each increase, Mr. John Dragoo of Dragoo and Associates, Blendon Square Apartments, has donated \$1,000 to the HRAA to offset the cost of and help with the opposition. Blendon Square Apartments are part of the Huber Ridge area and the HRAA. They are master metered, meaning Blendon Square pays one bill for all 212 apartments. To Dragoo and Associates, thank you for your support!

In June 2009, OAWC filed a request with the PUCO to increase rates for all of its approximately 48,000 residential customers in Ohio. This request is the third in three years and may increase residential customers' water and sewer bills for each of the next four years if the proposed step increases are approved by the PUCO.

OAWC has asked for the approval to collect an additional \$25 million over four years for all customer classes. In addition to the increase, OAWC has proposed to increase the current \$9.51 monthly customer service charge to \$15.87 by 2013. OAWC has also requested to establish an unavoidable expense recovery charge in 2013. This charge would allow OAWC to adjust for any increase or decrease in gross receipts, taxes, waste disposal, purchased power expense, purchased water cost, chemical cost, uncollectible expense, and any expenses due to decisions rendered by a regulatory body, i.e., PUCO, Ohio EPA.

OAWC also has asked to create an infrastructure replacement cost recovery charge in 2013. This charge is similar to the existing system improvement charge already available to OAWC under Ohio law. This proposal would allow OAWC to collect costs for improvements made to water lines, hydrants, mains, lift stations, valves, and meters. It would also allow OAWC to collect the costs of these improvements with interest—which is not allowed under Ohio law—and collect expenses for major plant work up to \$3 million, which is only allowed for consideration in a rate case.

This chart shows what the rates would be if the OAWC

increase request was granted by the PUCO in full. The preceding chart was calculated by the OCC.

If the proposed increase is acceptable to you, then there is no need to read on. For those of you who are disgusted with these frequent increases, OAWC's monopoly of our communities, outrageous water and sewer bills, OAWC's single handed ability to degrade the same neighborhoods they serve, then read on.

Again, we will oppose this increase, but this year is different. We need to organize and oppose this increase with a bigger campaign than the last two increases. This application for increase has spawned more resistance than ever. Our collection opposition for the last two increases coupled with this increase has finally caught the attention of some of our elected officials both locally and at the state level. Our legislators are looking at old laws and what can be updated or changed. There are numerous other things being looked at by our local, county, and state offices. Currently I cannot elaborate on these things.

You, the residents/customers, made the difference in the last two increases. You made some noise and now have brought some attention to OAWC's frequent and large increases. As a community, we need to write and attend the PUCO public hearing as before but in bigger numbers. We need to write our elected officials and let them know enough is enough, also. There is an insert in this issue of *The Herald* with all the contact information. If this opposition is not our biggest, then other avenues that are being looked into may not work.

Your letters should be personalized this time. For example, with this increase, I will have to choose between my water bill and my prescriptions. The water prices have lowered my home's value as I cannot afford to landscape and so on. Write about any experiences with OAWC: customer service, water quality issues, etc. You have made a difference in the past; let's continue the momentum as others are now joining, and legislators are watching.

Several local/state communities have banded together and are opposing the OAWC in other ways legally. There is now a state-wide website with up-to-date news and facts: fightthehikeohio.org. Check it frequently as we move forward. There will be a link from our website, huberridge.org. This is your community—your home. You have made a difference.

October 2009...........PUCO staff report to be filed

November 2009.........Testimony and objections to be filed

February 2010.........A final decision by the PUCO expected

March 2010.........Any applications for rehearing to be filed


April 2010..........A decision on any applications for rehearing expected

## Rumpke—Township Trash Carrier

Last December, the Blendon Township Trustees approved a 1-year contract with Rumpke to provide trash



disposal, recycling, and yard waste removal for Blendon Township residents. This one-year contract was to fill the year before Blendon Township was to join the trash consortium. This year a bid package was put out, and four trash carriers took out bid packages including Local Waste and Rumpke. Only one trash carrier returned a bid—Rumpke. On August 5, 2009, at the Blendon Township Trustee meeting, John Giamarco presented the Trustees with a new contract from Rumpke. Trustee Jerry Ward made a motion to accept the notice of acceptance for Rumpke, which includes authorizing Blendon Township to enter into a contract with Rumpke for the contract period for a 5-year consortium pricing with a 2-year option at the price of \$15.64 per month. Trustee Stewart Flaherty seconded the motion. All three Trustees voted in favor of the motion.

I have received numerous calls from residents in the last 6 months regarding trash pickup problems. I have handled or forwarded the information as permitted. The Trustees have delegated the Blendon Township Director of Code Enforcement, Bryan Rhoads, to handle all trash complaints and compliments. 



#### "Love Your Pet" Grooming Shop

This article continues a report on another fine business located right here in Blendon Township. If you have a dog or cat, there is a great grooming service right here to help keep your pet healthy, happy, and beautiful! Check out "Love Your Pet" Grooming Shop located at 5858-A Westerville Road in Glengary Shopping Center. This shop is run by Flo Doyle.

Here are the interview questions I asked Flo:

How long has "Love Your Pet" been in business at your current location? August 5, 1985—24 years

How long have you been in the pet grooming business? Flo has been in the pet grooming business for 30 years since 1979.

How did you get started in this business? Flo's first business was a full-line pet shop. The shop offered grooming services, which were done by another employee. Flo was thrust into the grooming side of the business when the shop's groomer left. Now some 30 years later, Flo is still doing the grooming and loving it.

**Do you only groom dogs and cats?** Sorry, all you monkey owners; Flo only grooms dogs and cats, and she does not do toddlers.

Have you ever groomed any unusual animals during your career? Have you ever heard of a Bedlington Terrier? It looks more like a sheep than a dog. If you get a chance, check out a picture of a Bedlington Terrier on the internet. Well, Flo groomed one of these at one time. Now if Flo can groom a Bedlington Terrier, then she can groom any dog you have.

What grooming services do you offer? The normal grooming services involve the bath, nails, ears, eyes, anal glands, blow dry, brushing, combing, and scissoring.

What is the cost of your grooming services? It depends upon the size and condition of the dog and how much time is spent. For example, totally scissoring a dog requires a lot of time and skills. Another factor that

occasionally plays into cost is the disposition of the dog, which may present some challenges.

What do you like best about your job? Flo likes seeing the finished work: a well groomed pet that is nice and neat and scissored well.

How do you give a cat a bath? Very carefully! © Have you ever had to give a really big dog like a St. Bernard a bath? How do you do that? The "Love Your Pet" shop does large dogs all the time. Flo and her staff all work as a team and help each other to hold and lift the dogs when necessary.

What is your favorite dog that you like to groom and why? Flo likes to groom scissored breeds like Poodles, Buchons, or Westies because she gets to be really creative, and they look the best when finished.

What is your favorite cat you like to groom and why? Flo doesn't really have a favorite cat to groom because most cats do not take to grooming very well. They tolerate combing, but getting shaved and bathed usually are not their favorite things.

What kind of training is needed to do your job? To become a good groomer, you need to spend time learning as an apprentice under someone or go to a qualified grooming school. But the real talent for grooming is a gift that people either have or don't have. This is a natural ability that is brought out and enhanced with training. As Flo put it, no amount of practice will make a person a good groomer. Groomers are not "made"; they are "brought out," and their skills are "honed."

How do you handle difficult pets? Difficult pets are handled carefully and sometimes with help. If necessary, a gentle muzzle is sometimes used. Some dogs exhibit a totally different personality when gently muzzled, and then they are not as aggressive.

How often should a person have his or her pet groomed? Generally every 4 to 8 weeks depending upon the breed and 3 to 4 times a year for large coated breeds.

What would you say is special about your grooming business that sets you apart from other grooming businesses? Flo is a licensed Animal Health Technician and can spot problems because she is much more aware of things to look for that could potentially cause problems for the animal down the road. When Flo sees something of concern, she will notify the customer to contact his or her vet.

Has the recent economic situation affected your business? According to Flo, the recent economic situation has affected her business very much.

If you could summarize your business philosophy in one or two sentences, what would it be? To be fair and honest always—your integrity and reputation are very important when you have a small, personalized business.

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### Blendon Township Police Ask, "Where Did the Summer Go?"

As you read this article, sounds of school buses, leaf blowers, and other typical fall sounds will hopefully replace the sounds of expensive air conditioners and costly water sprinklers. The summer sounds of sirens heard by many residents of the Karikal Road area will never be forgotten. For several weeks, residents lived in fear because of turmoil between several families resulting in assaults, threats, and gun fire on a street normally known for its tranquility.

Not only did this tax the emotions of many residents, it put a heavy burden on the Police Department answering calls for services. The police response was fast, the situation "of the moment" was calmed, and reports (many) were taken with some "on-view" arrests. Incidents continued with more reports and "victims" referred to the Franklin County Prosecutor's Office to seek legal action. The Police Department increased police presence both uniformed and covert in attempts to quell further turmoil and restore the tranquility. The Detective Bureau is still actively investigating all leads received and has high hopes of identifying those involved in the drive-by shooting which fortunately only resulted in property damage. The Police Department would like to express their gratitude to all those who assisted as witnesses or called in suspicious activities associated with the unrest in the area.

The Police Department has been very busy throughout the summer not only in response to crime but also in traffic enforcement and community services. The Department consists of a chief, a lieutenant, 2 sergeants, 2 detectives, and 11 patrol officers. Your 1<sup>st</sup> shift (7 a.m. to 3 p.m.) and 2<sup>nd</sup> shift officers continue to patrol the Township conducting residential and business checks when they are not answering calls for service. Your 3<sup>rd</sup> shift (11 p.m. to 7 a.m.) officers also conduct these checks and, when not answering calls for service, have been very active in OVI (impaired driver) enforcement with well over a hundred arrests so far this year. This has a strong impact on highway safety, which has

contributed to the reduction of traffic crashes within the Township.

Your Detective Bureau is very busy managing and investigating a high volume of criminal cases. Prioritizing cases is a challenge for follow-up investigations, and keeping a victim content on a case progress is a difficult task at times. All investigative cases get reviewed, and many are resolved by arrests and criminal charges.

The Department has participated in many community events this year including Ridge-a-Palooza at Faith Covenant Church on May 30 and the Westerville Cops & Kids Day at Hoff Woods Park on September 13.

In closing, I would like to stress the importance of crime prevention. It takes a minute to safeguard your property—however, in many cases, only half that time for someone to steal or damage your property. Please remain or become involved in YOUR Block Watch program. It has been proven that the unity between the Police Department and the Block Watch program has been successful in making arrests and reducing crime.

## The Latest Buzz— Fire Pits and Safety

Recent questions about fire pit usage in the neighborhood prompted us to do research on the matter. We contacted Chief Bernie Ingles, Westerville Fire, who directed us to John Bokros, Battalion Chief of Fire Prevention, Westerville Fire.

Unless otherwise noted, information below is from John Bokros.

Q. Some residents use urn-like containers; some have built stone pits to burn fires in their backyards. Is this permissible?

A. The fires you describe are classified by the Ohio Fire Code as recreational fire. A permit is not needed from the Fire Division [for this type of fire].

Chief Bernie Ingles wrote, "Basically, since you are in the Township, what you are describing is legal. These fires are regulated by the Ohio EPA. If there is a fire that may present a danger, please call us; and we will respond."

Battalion Chief John Bokros provided general regulations as follows:

- Fires should not be closer than 25 feet of a structure. [this means any structure—wood fence, etc.]
- All wood should be clean burning. [seasoned wood—not leaves, not paper, etc.]
- Recreational fires shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. [make sure the fire is extinguished before you leave it]

All other open burning must have a permit issued by the Westerville Fire Division and/or the Ohio EPA.

To report emergencies, call 911. To report a nonemergency fire issue, call the radio room at 901-6790.

### Water Rate Got You Down? Read This and Save Green.

This article was inspired by a resident of Huber Ridge quoted in a Westerville paper as saying that the water rate increase nearly caused her not to plant flowers this year. The water rate increase will also potentially impact the quantity and quality of entries into the yearly Huber Ridge Bl®®ms contest.

Native perennial prairie gardening is a tremendous way to save time, money, water, and energy. The strength, vigor, and vitality of the plants will also make you seem like a better gardener than perhaps you really are. *Perennial* means you only plant once, and the plants come back stronger every year.

I am not advocating just allowing an area to go fallow in hopes that what comes in will be native. Most of the time in this situation, non-native invasives will take over and do more harm than good. I am recommending matching the correct native plant to the soil type and light conditions available and arranging them by temperament, size/color, and benefit to maximize results.

Native plant gardening is easier. You will save time, money, and effort and will have happier plants in the end. Happy native flowers are easier to look at, more valuable to the environment, and beneficial to the community. Native prairie plants are extremely resistant to drought, heat, cold, insects, and rabbit and deer damage. They do not need fertilizer or special care, only a fighting chance. They do, however, need watered occasionally until they are established. Once this happens, you will be amazed how tough and hardy these plants truly are. They are perfectly suited for our soil, climate, and weather cycles because they are native to Ohio. Give them the space, light, and soil type they need; and they will do the rest.

The secret to the success of these plants lies in the taproot, which acts as a water, nutrient, and energy storing device. Should another fall hurricane come and blow seeds all over Blendon Township, native seeds will fly away at 85 mph continued on 21

to repopulate areas they once occupied instead of the nonnative invasives that got blown into our yards.

Not treating your lawn with chemicals also provides many wonderful benefits. You won't have to mow or water your lawn as often, and the money you save on water, chemicals, and mower gas and maintenance can be used to pay your water bill. Not mowing as often saves you time as well. The biodiversity of your lawn will change—favoring drought tolerant greenery rabbits prefer to eat. Rabbits then will not be forced to rely solely on the plants you don't want them to eat. Children will once more be able to enjoy butterflies, hummingbirds, crickets, grasshoppers, fireflies, and June bugs (which erupt in May) just as most of us over 40 did as children.

Lawn chemicals and mosquito fogging indiscriminately kills the larval and adult stages of beneficial insects, butter-flies, and pollinators—making a problematic situation worse. Excess insects produced by healthy natural lawns are readily consumed by songbirds, bats, toads, ladybugs, dragonflies, and montids. Water going to the storm drain will be cleaner and safer should it end up in the drinking supply. Earthworms will naturally aerate your soil consuming dog exhaust, leaves, and lawn clippings. Native Mason and European honeybees in peril all over the U.S. will find safe haven in your yard. Pollinators are vitally important to life as we know it. Without them, we will have fewer types of food and less food to eat.

Augment the soil prior to planting with organic materials working like a sponge to hold water and allow easy root penetration. Screened rain barrels installed near downspouts allow one to save hundreds of gallons of water without the worry of mosquitoes. (The hose attaches at the bottom, and gravity releases the water.) Larger underground units with electric pumps are also available to maximize water independence. Everybody wins except for the water and chemical companies and those who object to allowing what was here before we were given a chance to exist. Give it a try. You'll be glad you did.

#### Litter Box Etiquette 101— How to Prevent and Deal with Inappropriate Elimination in Cats

One of the most common complaints we hear as veterinarians is a client's kitty has decided not to use the litter box and rather will urinate and defecate at other places in the family home. This creates a great deal of stress in the household as odors and the extra cleaning tasks can make life unpleasant. So why does this happen, and how can this behavior be prevented? First, your veterinarian should be consulted to rule out health problems such as urinary tract infections that may increase the urgency to urinate. If infections and other problems are ruled out, then the answers may lie in the understanding of basic feline behavior. Cats are fastidiously clean animals. They like their food and water bowls clean, their coats clean, and most of all they like a clean litter box. And who can blame them? Have you ever been faced with a dirty port-a-potty at a public event? Or a filthy gas station restroom? Same thing for a kitty with a dirty litter box except they have fewer acceptable alternatives!

So how clean is clean? You may be surprised. Cats have remarkable well developed senses of smell and can detect odors that we may not smell. Starting out clean is important. When you buy a new litter box, scrub it well with hot, soapy water and then rinse and air dry. This will remove strange odors from shipping and handling that may be offensive to your cat. If the box has been previously used (think garage sale purchase), then wash as above and follow with a soak in ½ cup of bleach to a gallon of water. Let this sit a while and then rinse thoroughly. Household bleach is an excellent disinfectant. Other types of disinfectants are not recommended because they may be potentially harmful to you and your cat. Ammonia is not a good choice because its odor can smell like urine, and your cat may think the box is already dirty when it is freshly washed.

Once a box has been cleaned and filled with litter, you must keep it clean. Scoopable litter products may give you a false sense of security and lead you to believe that an occasional

scooping is good hygiene. For some cats, a box that has been used only once becomes unacceptable for a second use. If you only have time to scoop on a normal, busy day, then at least try to accomplish this twice a day. Then plan on scrubbing and disinfecting the box at least weekly. Your cat will let you know when you are not doing this often enough!

So let's say you are an avid box scrubber, and your feline friend is still offending. When this happens, we need to examine the situation further. Some cats prefer and require two boxes—one for urination and one for defecation (yes, they really can make this distinction!). Sometimes other features of the box are problematic. For example, the plastic liners sold in stores may be rejected by cats due to their strange odor or the "feel" of the bag on their feet. Or you may have chosen a box with a lid, and your cat does not like the dark, cave-like interior. Your choice of litter or the amount you use may not be to your cat's liking. Strongly scented types may be pleasing to you but may be offensive to your kitty. Some cats prefer shallow litter while others prefer deeper. You may opt to try several types and amounts to see if these changes make a difference.

Location of the litter box and the number of boxes can both factor into inappropriate elimination issues. This is especially true if you have more than one cat. Cats are very private animals, and you may need to find a more sheltered location to place the litter box. And certainly expect to provide at least one box per cat. Remember, cats mark their territories and initiate battles with urine and feces; so it is not uncommon for them not to want to share another cat's box!

A cat that has been eliminating outside the litter box for a while may need to be retrained. This can be accomplished by choosing a small room and closing both your kitty and the box inside for a few days. If this is a bathroom, put an inch or so of water in the tub so that he/she won't decide to use the tub as a box. And make sure there are no piles of laundry around to act as "litter"! Once your cat is using the box, then you can slowly release him into the house as a whole.

Now how about that spot on your carpet that your kitty always goes back to! Enzyme-containing carpet cleaners are available at most pet stores. These will remove urine odors, but they take time (even weeks) to work. So once you apply as directed, cover the affected area with aluminum foil, a sheet of plastic, or (better still) a plastic carpet runner laid down with the points facing upward.

So, as you can see, keeping a happy kitty and a clean litter box go hand in hand. Keep the litter box in tiptop shape and consider your cat's preferences over yours. These steps should make your home a feline friendly place to be!
